CLEAN YOUR STREAMS

This year clean your streams was held on September 17, 2011. This is an annual event and our Road Superintendent Bryon McIntosh chairs this event for the township locations. This year 7 of the 726 volunteers cleaned at 2 different sites in Washington Township and removed over 22 bags of trash and 24 tires. If interested in volunteering for next year, contact the Road Superintendent at the township office.

FALL LEAF PICK UP

We plan to start leaf pickup the last week of October. In order to protect operators and equipment please follow these basic rules:

- -All leaves must be loose
- -Put leaves next to curb
- -NO leaves in the street
- -NO tree trimmings
- -NO sticks or twigs
- -No parking next to or over top of leaf piles

Your cooperation will make this process run much smoother and safer!

Do you need help removing Ash Trees from your yard? If you do, the W909 Community Action Commission Inc. can help. You could receive approval for 40% Cost Share assistance for tree removal only of up two Ash Trees. SNOW REMOVAL

If the forecast calls for snow in excess of 2", we ask that you refrain from parking on the street. This provides the snowplows the clearance they need to clean the streets and eliminates cars from being "plowed in." The following tips help to expedite snow removal:

- Stay back at least 50' from the rear of the plow truck so the driver can see you. (If you can't see the
 driver in his mirror he can't see you.)
- * Park your vehicles in the driveway and don't allow any vehicles to hang out into the roadway.
- * Children are attracted to snowplow trucks. Teach your children to stay behind the sidewalks when they see trucks coming.
- * Avoid passing or driving beside these trucks.
- When shoveling your driveway, avoid placing the snow from your driveway back into the street.
- Remember to clear sidewalks adjacent to your property.

During heavy snow there is a possibility that you may experience more plowed snow at the end of your driveway. This cannot be helped, it is not done to cause aggravation or to anger anyone. The main objective is to clear the roadways and make them safe for necessary travel. When clearing snow at the end of your driveway, please shovel it to either side of your driveway and not back into the roadway.

We thank you for your continued understanding and cooperation.

ZONING DEPARTMENT

BLIGHT VIOLATIONS ARE ISSUED FOR:

- Areas which have grass, groundcover plantings, shrubs, trees that are not kept in a healthy, neatly trimmed condition or woodpiles, skids or other burnable materials that harbor rodents, or other animal or insect infestation.
- Grass height over five inches.
- Vegetation that encroaches on adjacent properties.
- Firewood that is not stacked or piled under six feet in a reasonably compact and orderly fashion in the rear yard elevated six inches, six feet off the lot lines.
- Building exteriors that are not in good condition or with partially completed siding or painted walls.
- Domestic refuse not stored in cans without lids and placed or located in the front yard.
- Dilapidated and structurally unsound accessory buildings and the like shall be considered to be trash or waste material and must be removed.
- A motor vehicle that is a "junk motor vehicle" (ORC 4513.65) on any lot.

Our township donated \$200.00 to become a sustaining member of the CWMA. Shantee Creek from Suder to Summit will receive an aerial application soon.
