TRUSTEE NEWS

It seems like only yesterday we sent out the spring newsletter, and here it is September already. The locust are sounding out the approach of yet another fall season here at the southern most tip of Lake Erie.

With the advent of cooler weather, it is time to think about all those tasks associated with winter in our neck of the woods. As the trees shed their coats of may colors we will break out the leaf rakes and snow shovels.

Each of us routinely make sure our snow-blowers are tuned up and our windows and doors are caulked and sealed up for the winter blast. We are buying plenty of firewood and sidewalk salt, getting ready for short days and long nights. But don't forget, as the last leaf makes it's way to the ground, and the trees have completed their annual show of colors in preparation for their long winters nap. The gutters, don't forget to clean the gutters.

On a similar note, before the snow flies, take a drive down your street, and when you come to your house drive by and try and see it as your neighbors do. We sometimes get so use to seeing the place where we reside, we become blind to an unsightly pile of brush or lumber or yard toys that have out lived their usefulness and are stacked along side our garage or other places in our yard.

Do yourself and your neighbors a favor and discard the unsightly and unwanted items, and unclutter your yard. if something is broken repair it, or discard it. If something needs painting, please paint it.

We live in a clean, safe community. Let's keep it that way. If we all do our part Washington Township will continue to be a community we can continue to be proud of!

DUMP THE DRUGS

The Washington Township Police Department has again partnered with the Washington Township Fire Department and the United States D.E.A to provide a safe, secure, and convenient way to dispose of old outdated and unwanted drugs. Saturday October 26th between 10:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M. at the Township Fire Station on Shoreland Avenue. Prescription and "over the counter" drugs in any form will be accepted. Also accepted are syringes, applicators, and other utensils that are used to distribute and deliver drugs.....no questions asked.

This will be the third time we have offered this program. Last Spring this successful program resulted in more than 80 pounds of unwanted drugs being disposed of in a safe and secure manner. Spread the word, as this is not limited to just Washington Township residents anyone may participate!

WHAT'S GOING ON IN THE TOWNSHIP?

Wonder why the Police were stopped down the street, or why the Fire Department was in such a big hurry? Each week in the <u>Point & Shoreland Journal</u> a section called The Daily Log lists all of the activity of the Washington Township Police Department. We never list names or house number in the log, but we do list what the type of incident occurred.

SCHOOL DAYS

Hear that sound? Or rather; hear the silence? Yep! It's back to school time, and that means several important things. During selected times in the morning and afternoon "SCHOOL SPEED LIMITS" take effect in and around school buildings. The school speed limit drops to 20 MPH. On Suder Avenue where Shoreland Elementary is located, the area along Suder, East Harbor and Alexis is affected by the "School Speed Limits." Traffic citations issued for violating the posted speed limit are expensive and may require a court appearance. The Police Department again this year will be observing traffic around Shoreland Elementary. When leaving for work in the mornings be extra alert for students waiting at bus stops and walking through the neighborhoods. Those big yellow school buses will also be out in force picking up and dropping off the students. Look for the flashing YELLOW lights and prepare for the RED flashing lights on the bus as it approaches the bus stop. When the red lights flash and the side "STOP" sign swings out; ALL TRAFFIC MUST STOP!

ROAD DEPARTMENT



In November our renewal levy will be on the ballot this is NOT a "New Tax." This levy will help us maintain the excellent roads conditions and many more things that we do for you and our Township. I would like to Thank You for your Support.

Our annual road crack sealing program focused on the Raintree neighborhood this year. We used a tar and chip method to repair some of the areas. Be careful because there is a lot of loose stone in those sections.

We want to thank everybody for their cooperation with blocked streets, tore up driveways, all the noise, and most of all the dust. It was estimated that 80% of all the curbs on Shoreland had to be replaced. Thanks again for your cooperation and understanding.

We have been trying to keep up with the blight problem. Once we get the okay to cut the property, it is just a matter of a few days that we will be there to remedy the tall grass. If you notice a house that is vacant please let us know so we can forward this information on to the police department so they can do a house check on that property. This will help in keeping the neighborhood cleaner and safer. As you most know that if a property stands vacant for any amount of time , some people will come out and strip the house of anything of value.

With the "back to school bugs" singing their song, you know that fall is just around the corner. That means that the leaves will be falling soon. When you are doing your yard to rid the leaves, we ask that you do not put the leaves into the street, place them next to the curb, or roads edge. No twigs or branches please. And most important of all, no parking in the street next to your leaf piles.

After the leaves have fallen, sad to say that nasty four letter word (snow) will start. The road department is currently preparing the trucks for this task. If the forecast calls for a snow fall 2 inches or more please do not park in the street. This will eliminate your car from being "plowed in". Here are some tips that help us to remove the snow:

- → Stay back at least 50 feet from the rear of the snow plow.
- → Park your car in the driveway, and do not have any part of your vehicle hanging on to the street.
- \rightarrow Avoid passing or driving next to the trucks.
- → When doing your driveway, avoid placing snow back in to the street.
- → Remove all obstacles from the "road-right-of-way" clear zone.

The best rule of thumb when clearing your driveway; when you are looking at your house from the end of the driveway, place your snow on the LEFT side of driveway. Otherwise when the plow goes by it will not push that much snow back into your driveway. Please do not put the snow in the street. Remember that we do have a "curb to curb" snow removal policy.

VISIBILITY AND PUBLIC SAFETY

Lucas County and Washington Township regulations do not allow obstructions in the road right-of-way. Examples of such obstructions are as follows:

Address posts, rocks, wood, concrete/masonry blocks, spikes, bushes and plants.

SUBDIVISIONS ROAD RIGHT-OF-WAYS FULLERS, RAINTREE, SHORELAND HEIGHTS -60 FEET FULLERS CUL-DE-SACS, ALEXIS PLACE AND SHORELAND PROPER-50 FEET MAJOR ROAD RIGHT-OF-WAYS SHORELAND-60 FEET, SUDER-50 FEET

SHUNDLAND-UU FEET, SUDER-50 FEET

SUDER AND SUMMIT- AVAILABLE BY CALLING 419.392.5381

If your road right of way is 60 foot then you would measure 30 feet from the center of the road into your yard, that entire 30 feet is all road right-of-way and needs to be a <u>CLEAR ZONE</u>.

Unauthorized obstructions (including sight distance obstructions) in the right-of-way will be removed by County or Township personnel.

We ask all ghosts and goblins to be respectful and only approach houses with porch lights burning or houses that obviously are inviting Trick or Treaters to stop by.
