New Technology Being Used By Both the Washington Township Fire and Police Departments

A generous donation from the Bayview AMVETS Post allowed the Shoreland Firefighter's Association to purchase a new Bullard Thermal Imaging Camera for the WTFD. This new infrared technology gives firefighters the ability to locate victims in smoke-filled environments by seeing heat signatures through the smoke. This camera technology also protects our firefighters when entering a high-heat smoke-filled environment by 'showing' the location of dangerous levels of heat that could put firefighters at risk. This new piece of equipment was placed on Engine 72.

The Police Department is utilizing several new pieces of technology as part of the ongoing commitment to protect and serve. Mobile reporting technology was added late in 2016. It speeds up officers' ability to complete criminal reports and reduces paper waste. Now, a report can be completed and filed while inside a police vehicle or back at the Police Station. Printing reports and physically delivering them to Downtown Toledo is no longer necessary. Township Police Officers are using High Definition Body Cameras to video and audio record all interactions with the public. Additionally, Officers are currently training to use new 2-Shot Tasers that will directly interface with the body cameras. Finally, Police Officers are now carrying Naloxone (Narcan) in an attempt to combat the increasing incidents of heroin overdoses. The new style single dose canister is being provided by the Toledo-Lucas County Health Department.

ZONING DEPARTMENT

Thank you to all the residents that comply with our Zoning Resolution and take pride in our community! Unfortunately, zoning rules that have been in effect for years are still ignored by some residents. Zoning Violations are issued to inform these residents of our rules so they may correct the problem. This year has started off with residents voicing concerns about a number of issues. The Zoning Department is at work on the following compliance violations: refuse containers, vehicles, recreation and utility equipment that are parked or stored in the front yard; trees that hang over a neighbor's property that are not trimmed back to the owner's property line; and flagpoles, outdoor murals, sculptures and other works of art that have zoning restrictions. A reminder to all Township residents: permits are required for any structure or change on the property.

Blight continues to be a big issue. Blight is defined as: woodpiles, branches, construction debris, vehicle parts, objects placed outside of the house that do not belong in the yard; and overgrown grass and weeds.

ROADS DEPARTMENT

The 2016 leaf pick-up had to be cut short because of a mechanical issue. When repairs were finished, the snow started flying and we had to suspend the pick-up. We did a pick up January and know there are a lot of leaves still in yards. We will do an additional leaf pick-up from late-April to mid-May. We will be picking up leaves on an as-needed basis only. We will not be out every day

The annual crack sealing project will begin in the late May. Please avoid driving on the hot tar when you see the Road Department crew working! We will be concentrating in the Raintree and Shoreland Heights areas. If you notice large cracks in the pavement in any other area, please let the Roads Department know. Crack sealing is done each year to extend the life of our roads and prevent the pot holes from forming.

Lucas County will be working with us this year to rebuild another six street sewer catch basins that are deteriorating. They also will be assisting in cleaning out some of the sewer lines. On that note, **please remember to avoid blowing grass clippings into the street** when grass cutting season begins. The street sewers are for water only...water that flows into our streams and eventually into the lake. Grass clippings and debris cause clogs.

Our Department keeps up with the blight problem. Once we get authorization from the Board of Trustees to proceed with grass cutting, we will be out to remedy a blight violation (i.e. tall grass). Let the Roads Department or Police Department know about a vacant house! The Police Department can do a house check on that property to keep it from becoming a target for thieves and vandals. It also helps to keep the neighborhood cleaner and safer.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The State of Ohio has mandated on-going training for all Police Officers employed by Police and Sheriff Departments in Ohio. Continuing Professional Training, or CPT, is a mandatory set of training classes that are administered via webinars and online from the State Attorney General's Office through OPOTA. This year all Police Officers will undergo 20 hours of CPT. The training will include Trauma-Based Policing and Legal Updates, which covers Domestic Violence, Civil Liability and Human Trafficking. All Officers are given an online account granting access to the OPOTA website. This site offers modules of training allowing Officers to take courses that exceed the 20 hour requirement. The State of Ohio has a long history and reputation for its training requirements of Police Officers and continues to be recognized nationwide for its commitment to safety and service to all Citizens.
